A Spot Light on Year 12 Lessons - Photography with Mrs Rockliffe

With uncertainty about when we will return to school it has been clear that in Photography we needed to prepare for the year 12 students to start doing practical work from home. The process of this began by the students planning out what their practical work will include and what equipment and resources they will require to be able to achieve this from home. Once all the photoshoots had been planned the students were then required to compile a list of equipment they would need or didn't already have access to at home. The equipment and resources were then all gathered from school and delivered to the doorsteps of each individual student with antibacterial gel and wipes to hand and of course the 2m rule applied!

Now with all the equipment required the photography students will begin the photoshoots for their personal projects, which will be 60% of their final A Level grade!

Next half term will see more one to one Team sessions to discuss and support the student's use of the camera and lighting at home, class sessions to share and discuss the photoshoots taken and online Photoshop tutorials!



Quote of the Week from our Vice Principal – Ms Just


It may seem strange that as an English teacher, I am choosing a quotation by a theoretical physicist rather than Austen or one of the Brontes, but in many ways a physicist is as imaginative and open to the unknown and the wonderful as any writer or novelist. At such an unprecedented time, I feel that Einstein's words resonate with me and also help guide my actions and thoughts.



As a country and indeed globally, we need to learn from the experience of other countries and systems, and of course from history, as it does tend to repeat itself... remember the Spanish Flu. As individuals, I am sure we have all looked back and now value the things we took for granted before lockdown; seeing friends and family, playing in teams, pursuing our hobbies, maybe playing or watching football and so much more. Hopefully moving forwards, we will see people more frequently, be grateful to the NHS and all our key workers and truly enjoy the freedoms we normally have.

However, it is all too easy to think of all we have had to sacrifice over the last months and the things we have lost, so it is important to remember Einstein's words that we must 'live for today' and not take things for granted.
