COVID-19 update

- On Wednesday 19th January, the Prime Minister announced that all COVID-19 Plan B measures will be removed in England, with a full return to Plan A by Thursday 27th January. In education and childcare settings, this means that from Thursday 20th January, face coverings (masks) are no longer recommended in classrooms and teaching spaces. Should any individual wish to continue wearing a face covering (mask) in any classroom that would continue to be supported by the school, but it is no longer recommended by the Department for Education. Students should continue to wear face coverings (masks) in indoor communal areas, including in assemblies at present.
- From Monday 17th January, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to school immediately on day 6.
- The first test must be taken no earlier than day 5 of the self-isolation period, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be <u>reported to NHS Test and Trace</u>.
- If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.
- Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10-day period of self-isolation.
- If double vaccinated it is not necessary for adults to self-isolate if symptom free, if deemed to be in close contact by NHS Track & Trace, but daily lateral flow tests should be taken for 7 consecutive days.
- If adults are not double vaccinated, it is necessary to self-isolate if NHS Track & Trace deem that you are a close contract whether or not you have symptoms.
- Students under the age of 18 years and 6 months do not need to self-isolate if deemed a close contact and remain symptom free they are strongly advised to do daily lateral flow tests for 7 days.
