Assembly Rota 2021/22

Aims:

A published **Theme for the week** underpins the assemblies and provides a focus for Tutor time. The main aims of assemblies at Haileybury Turnford are to develop the following:

- Social, moral, spiritual, cultural, P&SD and citizenship agenda,
- The values underpinning the school's behaviour policy, **Haileybury Turnford** Student Character Traits and Ready, Respectful and Safe
- The school's commitment in pursuing **ambition**, **pride** and **success** for the entire school community and each individual student.
- Promotion of **British Values** including the fundamental British Values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

(Underlined key words link specifically to one of the Haileybury Turnford student character traits our curriculum aims to promote and develop in every student.

1. To develop student understanding of SMSC objectives:

2. Spiritual development should be seen throughout the way students can:

- Discuss and reflect on key questions of meaning and truth
- Reflect on important concepts, experiences and <u>beliefs</u> that are at the heart of religious and non-religious views
- Value <u>relationships</u> and develop a sense of belonging
- Develop the imagination
- Develop a curiosity for life
- To understand the value of the non-material dimension of life
- To appreciate a sense of wonder at the universe and the world we live in
- Develop an <u>understanding</u> of feelings and emotions which gives cause to <u>reflect</u> and learn

Moral development should be seen by the extent to which students display:

- An understanding of the difference between <u>right and wrong</u>
- Developing an <u>understanding</u> of ideas, such as justice, honesty, and truth
- <u>Reflecting on the sources of moral thinking</u> (religious or non-religious)
- Exploring the influence of family, friends, and the media on moral choices
- Developing the ability to make responsible and <u>thoughtful judgements</u> on moral issues

Social development should be developed through:

• The quality of <u>relationships</u> in school

- The ability to behave responsibly and use <u>initiative</u> (considering the importance of rights and responsibilities and developing a sense of social conscience)
- The ability to work successfully and <u>co-operatively</u> with one another, in small groups and the school community (Encountering challenging and unfamiliar contexts such as residential and community-based work, work related learning and working with professionals and experts)
- Understanding the importance of <u>core values</u> and social ideals, including democracy, human rights, the rule of law, social justice, political and legal equality, tolerance, and a commitment to dialogue and understanding
- <u>Valuing diversity and equality</u> in society, including age, disability, ethnicity, gender, religious beliefs, and sexual orientation
- Developing an awareness of <u>environmental issues</u> and the importance of climate change
- Reflecting on, and valuing leadership and volunteering

Cultural development is seen by the extent to which students:

- Widen their knowledge, understanding, personal interest and experiences through the school curriculum and their participation in a wide range of <u>cultural activities</u>
- Understanding <u>cultural diversity</u> within society and explore their own cultural assumptions and values
- Encourage a <u>historical perspective</u> by relating contemporary values to the processes and events that have shaped them
- Understand the importance of art and <u>creativity</u> in human life and the heights of human achievement
- <u>Reflect</u> on the role of performance for building self-confidence and identity
- Year Achievement Coordinators will be responsible for the management, control, and dismissal of the assembly and for introducing the 'speaker' for each assembly.

Inclusive – to consider others and the impact of actions on them. To respect others and the diverse community we live in

Ethical – to understand their responsibilities and rights. To consider the impact of actions when making choices and consider their role in sustaining the environment and planet

Team Players – to lead and play different roles, to work together collaboratively and give their energy and time to help others

Ambitious – to set high standards and aspirations and create strong visions and goals for their future

Enterprising – identify and grasp opportunities and take measured risks. Plan, develop and finish projects and express their ideas through different media.

3.To ensure key issues of school life are addressed

• In addition, assemblies will be used to cover special events, key messages, and convey information particularly from the Student Leadership Group(s).

Expectations for Student behaviour in Assemblies

- If the assembly takes place in the Main Hall students will arrive promptly for assembly and will be seated in the Main Hall by the set time and ready for the assembly to start. Form tutors will register their groups.
- Students should be dressed smartly in correct school uniform, should not be chewing and should enter the Hall in silence or remain seated.
- Tutors will accompany their tutor group to the Main Hall and remain with the students to oversee seating to oversee correct seating in alphabetical order, by tutor group and monitor behaviour.
- The Year Achievement Coordinator and Assistant Year Achievement Coordinator will be responsible for the management, control, and dismissal of the assembly and for introducing and thanking the 'speaker' for each assembly in the Main Hall.
- The Assistant Principal overseeing each year group will attend the relevant assemblies in ensuring students are Ready, Respectful and Safe.
- If the assembly takes place virtually and, in a classroom, setting students will be expected to be seated in their seating plan positions and remain focused and silent throughout the assembly. Students will be expected to be in the correct school uniform and focusing solely on the assembly presentation. Tutors will be expected to monitor student behaviour and take a register.

Assemblies will follow a 5-day rotation system to include all year groups

N.B. If assemblies are to be delivered through MS Teams students will be expected to be in their Tutor classroom base, until further notice.

- Involve students in delivering the assembly.
- Include dance, drama, and music.
- Provide time for reflection.
- Recognise and celebrate achievement.
- Invite guest speakers.
