- Day 1: Charles is proclaimed King.
 - The new king will receive Parliament's motion of condolence at Westminster Hall and goes on a tour of the four nations.
- Day 2: The proclamation of Charles as King will be read out in all the capitals of the United Kingdom.
- Day 4: Coffin taken to Westminster Hall to lie in state for four days.
- Day 9 The Queen's funeral.



- The first black British female swimmer to represent Great Britain at the Olympics in Tokyo in 2021
- British marathon swimmer
- Co-founder of the Black Swimming Association



Learning objectives:



What has Alice Dearing been campaigning for?

- For swimming caps to be suitable for all hair styles
- For swimmers to be able to wear something known as a soul cap
- The soul cap for natural black hair was ruled out of Olympic Games
- The International Swimming Federation ruled out the soul cap
- The ISF said the soul caps did not fit 'the natural form of the head' and 'athletes competing at international events did not use or require caps of such size'.

Why did Alice Dearing campaign for black swimmer to be able to wear a soul cap?

- Alice understands why some girls might quit swimming over their hair
- She understands how it can be really damaging to self-image and confidence
- Chlorine can damage afro hair more than non-afro hair because of the bleach used in the pool
- Afro hair is naturally drier than non-Afro hair and this means it does not retain as much moisture
- Afro hair is more likely to suffer from the bleach added to the swimming pool and cause damage to the hair
- Alice was restricted by the types of hairstyle she could have because certain styles would not fit in a regular swimming cap
- She felt as if she had the wrong type of hair for swimming

Finally, there is no wrong hair for swimming ...

- A ban on Soul Caps designed to protect natural black hair was lifted on 2.09.22 by the International Swimming Federation
- Swimming has been made more inclusive and has removed the barrier to swimming for black swimmers with Afro-hair
- Brining inclusive swimwear into competitive swimming will hopefully remove some of the obstacles that are keeping swimmers away from the sport


