#### **Definitions**

#### **Safeguarding Children**

- The UK Government defines safeguarding children as to:
- Protect children from abuse and maltreatment
- Prevent harm to children's health or development
- Ensure children grow up with the provision of safe and effective care
- Take action to enable all children and young people to have the best outcomes





#### **Child Protection**

UNICEF defines a 'child protection system' as:

- The set of laws, policies, regulations, and services needed across all social sectors especially social welfare, education, health, security, and justice — to support prevention and response to protection-related risks.
- Child protection is, therefore, more specific than child safeguarding. It refers to protection put in place by specific agencies.









## **Safeguarding Duty of schools**

■ The Children Act 2004, as amended by the Children and Social Work Act 2017, placed new duties on key agencies in a local area. Specifically, the police, clinical commissioning groups and the local authority are under a duty to make arrangements to work together, and with other partners locally, to safeguard and promote the welfare of all children in their area.

Schools have an important part to play in safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children.



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## What is safeguarding in school?

- In the school setting SAFEGUARDING would include policies relating to:
- Child protection
- Student health & safety
- Behaviour policies and anti-bullying strategies
- Physical intervention
- Medical needs and first aid
- Premises security and Health and Safety
- Reporting Low Level Concerns
- Safer staff recruitment
- Internet safety
- Extremism and radicalisation (Prevent)





## Who is responsible?

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility

All staff must work together to promote a holistic approach to children's safeguarding and mental health needs.









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## Role of the DSL/DDSLs:

- 1. Manage Referrals to Early Help and Children's services
- 2. Signpost learners and families to support groups
- 3. Raise awareness of safeguarding in the school and the community
- 4. Work with and support others staff, volunteers, visitors, governors, headteacher, multiagency partners
- 5. Keep detailed, accurate written records







## **Staff Responsibilities:**

- Staff have a responsibility to provide a safe environment for learning.
- Staff should be able to identify any safeguarding concerns early, provide help and prevent concerns from escalating.
- Staff should identify pupils who may benefit from early help, i.e., support provided as soon as a problem emerges.
- If a staff member has a concern about a child, they should follow the school referral process
- Teachers should safeguard children's wellbeing and maintain public trust in the teaching profession as part of their professional duties.





## **Categories of abuse**

The most reported problems to schools and social services are:

- Emotional abuse
- Physical abuse
- Sexual Abuse
- Neglect



## The referral process at HT:

- A staff member identifies a concern. Is the student at risk of immediate harm?
- Yes Raise as a Cause for Concern and speak to a DSL and add the record of the concern on CPOMS
- The staff member discusses the concern with the DSL, taking into account observations, records of disclosure and professional judgment is a referral required?
- The DSL makes a referral to HCC Children's Services and informs the member of staff the actions and steps taken to safeguard the child
- If a referral is not required, the child continues to be monitored and early help is provided where necessary. If there is an escalation of concern a referral is made to Children's Services.
- If the disclosure or concern is regarding FGM or is outside of school hours the staff member makes a referral to the Police and CS.





#### Once a referral has been made:

- A social worker will notify the referrer that a decision has been made and one of the following responses will be actioned
- The child needs immediate protection and appropriate actions is taken by the social worker, police of NSPCC
- Where the child is at risk of significant harm but is not in immediate danger, a strategy meeting is held a Child in Need assessment is completed within 45 working days a Child Protection Plan may be required
- No formal assessment is needed the DSL supports and liaises with other agencies to arrange early help and appropriate support
- Staff keep the child's circumstances under review and re-refer if necessary to ensure circumstances improve – the students' best interest always comes first






## Students keeping themselves safe

- Knowing what to do when they are put under pressure and may feel uncomfortable, unhappy, or feel you have no power to refuse.
- Knowing who to speak to for support
- Recognising the different risks, they could meet in
- situations and knowing how to behave responsibly.
- Judging what kind of physical contact is acceptable, or unacceptable.
- Having the confidence to ask for help when they feel unhappy and need support.
- Following advice to stay safe online

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## How can you support your child(ren)?

- The best way to keep your child safe is to help them develop good judgment.
- Teach them to trust their instincts.
- Teach them that no one should ever keep secrets.
- Help them learn the rules of safety road safety, online safety
- Ensure they know the risks that they can face
- Check young people have safe relationships in their family, with their peers and with your staff.
- Create a home environment where it is OK to talk, even about the most difficult things. Talk to them and listen more than you talk
- Protect them never leave them with anyone that you don't trust fully.

- If worried about another child tell someone in school, call Hertfordshire Safeguarding Team on 0300 123 4042 or call the police






## **Mental Health Crisis Support Team**
