Communication and Contact

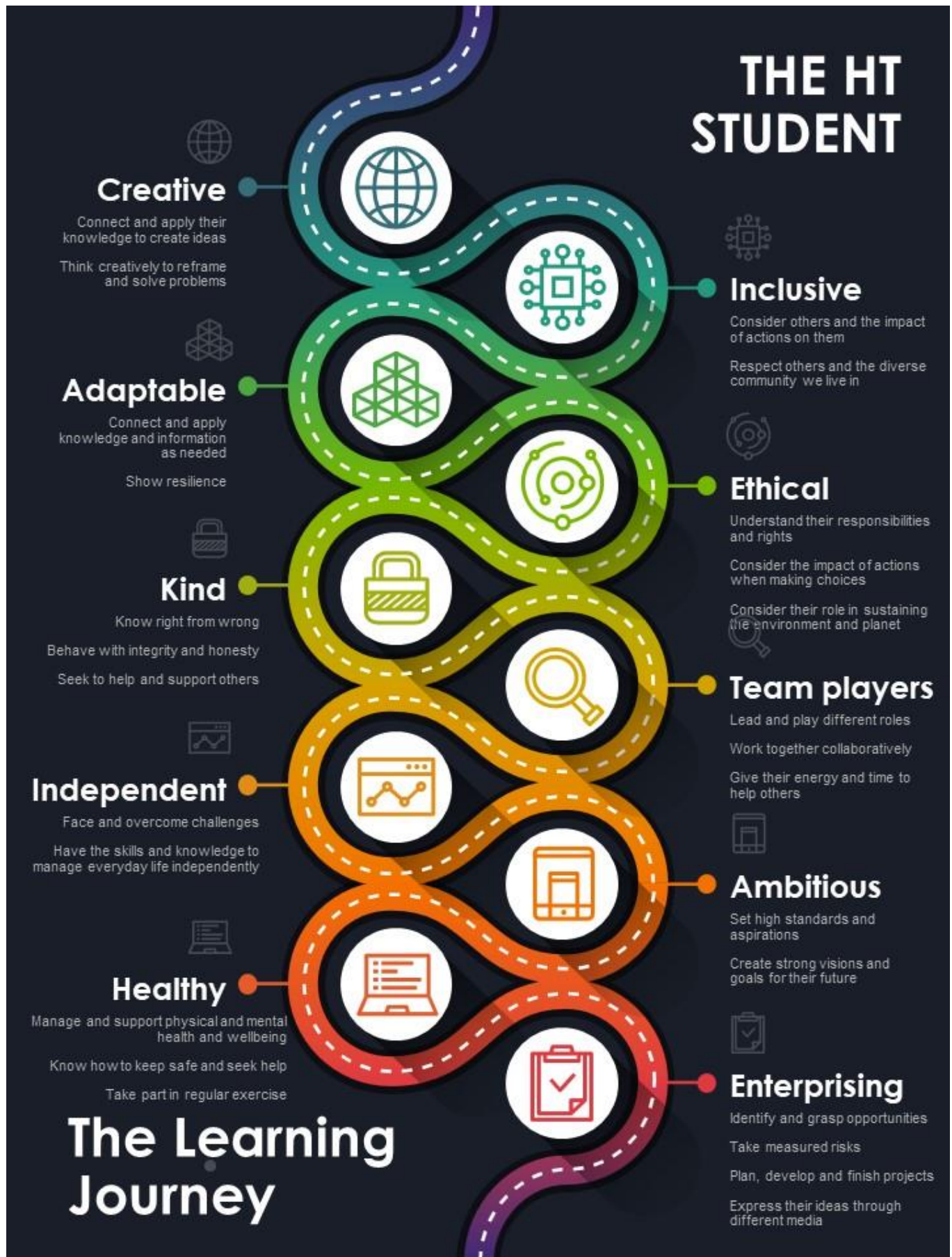

Haileybury Turnford Home-School Agreement

The aim of this Home-School Agreement is to establish a partnership between Haileybury Turnford, parents/carers and students so that we can work together to ensure students fulfil their academic aspirations and develop good character in accordance with the school's ethos, values and vision.

Responsibilities of the Parent or Carer

I will make sure my child is ready for school by:

- Making sure my child attends school every day unless they are unwell and at the required time and wearing the correct school uniform.
- Supporting the school policies including the Rewards, Behaviour and Discipline Policy.
- Requesting time off in advance for my child if he/she needs to be absent from school.
- Informing the school by text, email or telephone on the first day of absence giving the reason for my child's absence.
- Making certain my child has a school bag including the following correct equipment (2 pens, a pencil, a ruler, a rubber, a sharpener, all mathematics equipment including a calculator, and a refillable water bottle and PE kit).
- Making certain my child brings a suitable reading book to school each day.
- Attending meetings including parents' evenings with relevant members of staff to support my child.
- Encouraging positive attitudes towards school, learning and homework.
- Keeping up to date with information about how you can support your child, including using the Class Charts App.
- Supporting my child with completing set homework and promote additional reading at home.
- Talking to my child about the internet sites they use and report any concerns using the Child Exploitation Online Protection (CEOP) button on the HT website.
- Making early contact with the school on any matters affecting my child's progress, welfare or behaviour, including any medical conditions.
- Ensuring that if my child rides a bicycle to school, he/she rides it safely, it is well maintained. We would strongly recommend your child wears a cycle helmet.
- Keeping the school informed about changes to my contact details.
- Keeping informed of school events by reading HT News and regularly checking the school website and Class Charts App.
- Setting a good example to my own child and other students by respecting all members of the school community.

Responsibilities of the Students

I will make sure I am ready, respectful and safe for school by:

- Making sure I am on time to school each day and ready to learn in correct school uniform and have the correct equipment.
- Working to the best of my ability and being proud of my achievements.
- Not doing anything to bring the school into disrepute and being considerate and polite to members of the community, including on the way to and from school.
- Making sure I am polite, considerate and respectful to all staff, visitors and other students within the school.
- Following staff instructions at all times, and following all of the rules, guidance and expectations about health and safety.
- Being ready to learn and engage in all activities in lessons and trying my best at all times.
- Not disrupting any lesson, and if I do not understand an instruction or information, I will ask a teacher.
- Behaving responsibly and appropriately when using social networking sites, the internet and websites, and reporting any concerns via the Child Exploitation Online Protection (CEOP) button on the HT website.
- Paying attention to road safety on my way to and from school, ensuring that if I ride a bicycle to school, I will ride it safely and wear a cycle helmet.
- Following the school's policies on e-safety, including the use of mobile phones and social media.
- Looking after the school environment and keeping it litter free.

Responsibilities of the School

Haileybury Turnford staff agree to:

- Be calm and consistent, treat your child fairly, care for and nurture them, promoting their well-being.
- Help your child to develop a sense of responsibility and be considerate of others.
- Encourage, reward and celebrate when students go above and beyond.
- Ensure your child is well taught and provided with clear feedback to secure good progress.
- Keep you well informed about your child's academic progress and achievements.
- Keep you well informed about any concerns about your child's work, behaviour or relationships.
- Take prompt action when we are concerned about attendance and/or unauthorised absence.
- Keep you well informed about school events and general school matters.
- Provide appropriate guidance to enable your child to fulfil their potential and to make informed choices at each stage of their learning.
- Encourage and insist on high standards of behaviour, good manners and consideration for others.
- Provide a broad range of subjects and a variety of co-curricular activities.
- Provide information about school activities and events through HT News, the school website, social media, letters and Class Charts announcements.
- Take reasonable steps to ensure that all students are safe and secure.

Safe behaviour for learning: Responsible Internet Use at Haileybury Turnford

Rules for students

The school computer system provides Internet access to students and staff. This 'ICT User Agreement' will help protect students and the school by clearly stating what is acceptable and what is not.

- Access must only be made via the user's authorised account and password, which must not be given to any other person.
- School computer and Internet use must be appropriate to the student's education.
- Copyright and intellectual property rights must be respected.
- Users are responsible for email they send and for contacts made.
- Email should be written carefully and politely, as messages may be forwarded. Email is best regarded as public property.
- Anonymous messages and chain letters must not be sent.
- Use of public chat rooms and social media is not permitted.
- The school ICT systems may not be used for private purposes, unless the Principal has given prior consent for that purpose.
- Use for personal financial gain, gambling, political or advertising is forbidden.
- The security of the school ICT systems must not be compromised, whether owned by the school, or by other organisations or individuals.
- Irresponsible use may result in the loss of internet access.
- Cyber bullying will result in suspension of account and possible further action by the school.

The school may exercise its right by electronic means to monitor the use of the school's computer systems, including the monitoring of websites, the interception of emails and the deletion of inappropriate materials in circumstances where it believes unauthorised use of the school's computer system is or may not be taking place, or the systems is or may be being used for criminal purposes or for storing text or imagery which is unauthorised and unlawful.

Please ensure your child has read and understood the terms of conditions of Internet use at Haileybury Turnford. Within the induction pack you will find a form for your child to sign as acceptance of the above.

HT Bicycle Rider Safety Contract

To make cycling to school as safe as possible we ask all students who choose to cycle to school and their parents, to carefully read and agree to the terms set out in the Bike Rider Safety contract found below:

1. I will always use care and caution when riding my bike to and from school.
2. I will be courteous to other bike riders, pedestrian and students and will be alert to cars, buses and motorcycles.
3. I understand the school encourages me to a properly fitted bicycle helmet each time I ride my bike to and from school.
4. I will respect the school grounds and property of the school and not ride the bike on the school site.
5. I will be the only rider on my bike at any one time
6. I will observe the Highway Code (including road signs).
7. I will maintain control of my bike and not ride recklessly.
8. I will slow down and safely pass any pedestrians on the pavement.
9. I will make sure my bike is locked securely to the bike rack during school hours.
10. I understand that if I do not follow the conditions of this contract the student privilege of riding.

Conduct Cards

All students are expected to be **Ready, Respectful and Safe**. This card is used to record any times when a student is not **Ready, Respectful or Safe** outside of lessons. This can include uniform infringements, such as having an untucked shirt, wearing jewellery or wearing trainers without a valid reason and permission. Out of lesson infringements can be recorded by any member of staff. Six infringements in any one term will result in a one-hour payback. If your child were to reach 18 conduct points we will organise a school-based meeting to discuss concerns and ask you to work with us to support your child in being **Ready** for School, **Respectful** to all staff and other students and in ensuring they are always acting in a **Safe** way – they should aim to have zero conduct points at the end of the term. Students can also receive Achievement Points for going above and beyond in showing they are **Ready, Respectful and Safe**. For example, a student who is polite and courteous and cooperative with others can receive an Achievement Point.

Achievement System

Your child will earn one Achievement Point for every time they exceed our minimum standards of being **Ready, Respectful and Safe**.

Behaviour and Discipline: Ready, Respectful and Safe

We have high expectations as a school and expect every student to follow and maintain these expectations to ensure every child is valued and is able to achieve their potential and learn in an orderly and secure environment.

Behaviour Points System

The behaviour card system is used consistently across all subjects by staff. The purpose of the system is to ensure your child succeeds at Haileybury Turnford. Failure to meet these expectations could result in the following:

1 st Yellow Card	<p>1st Yellow Card (-1 Point)</p> <p>This means that your teacher has already tried to encourage you to make the right choice after verbally reminding you to be Ready, Respectful and Safe. Your Teacher and Form Tutor will follow up this issue with you.</p>
2 nd Yellow Card	<p>2nd Yellow Card (-2 Points)</p> <p>You are not following our expectations of being Ready, Respectful or Safe and as a result you will be sent to work in another classroom. You will receive a Payback at break or the end of the day to discuss an action plan and resolve the issue. Your Form Tutor will follow up this issue with you. Your Parent/Carer will be informed about your behaviour. If you continue to receive Yellow Cards you will receive a Faculty or Subject Leader Payback.</p>
Red Card	<p>Red Card (-6 Points)</p> <p>You will be given a Red Card if there is a one-off serious behaviour incident where you have not followed our expectations of being Ready, Respectful or Safe. For example, fighting or making racist comments. You will be removed by a staff member and taken to the Isolation Room. You will work in silence until your Resolve meeting. A Resolve meeting will be held at the earliest opportunity. Your Parent/Carer will be informed.</p>

Our praise and recognition system is designed to celebrate the success of all our students. It is underpinned by the belief that continual praise of each student's personal best behaviour and attitude to work is fundamental to establishing and reinforcing appropriate behaviour and work patterns.

Verbal praise, telephone calls home and positive postcards are used routinely to create and reinforce positive relationships at all times. They are recorded by the teacher on Class Charts.

The number of Achievement Points received by students is monitored by the Form Tutor, Year Achievement Coordinator and Assistant Year Achievement Coordinator. Individual progress is reviewed weekly and used as a basis for discussion and further achievement.

Every term, students will attend academic, community and sports awards celebratory assemblies.

Specific student rewards include:



Principal's Award

The Principal's Award is given to students from each year who are nominated by their Year Achievement Coordinator for outstanding personal achievement or outstanding contribution to the school community.

Principal's Book

Students are nominated by their subject teacher and invited to go along to the Principal's Office to show their excellent piece of work. The Principal then asks them to sign the Principal's Book and a mention is made in HT News, which is published twice each half-term.

Haileybury Turnford Award – KS3

Every time a student is awarded an achievement point in school they are working towards the achievement of the HT Award. The HT Award is our opportunity to recognise a student's diligence, effort and commitment to our school and to their studies.

The HT Award has 4 categories of success linked to the total achievement points received in lesson as well as contributions made in our school and/or in our local community.

How does the Haileybury Turnford Award work?

The HT Award has 5 categories:

- Bronze badge (achieved when 150 achievement points are reached)
- Silver badge (achieved when 500 achievement points are reached)
- Gold badge (achieved when 1,000 achievement points are reached as well as 1 recognised activity to the school e.g. representing the school in a sports fixture for example)
- Platinum Cup (achieved when 2,000 achievement points are reached as well as 2 recognised services to the school acknowledged by the Assistant Principal and Year Achievement Co-ordinator as meriting outstanding contribution to the core values of our school: Ambition, Pride, Success)



Once a student has achieved the necessary criteria they will be awarded with their respective badge and certificate in their assembly. Students will also receive a positive phone call home when the badges are awarded. Positive phone calls could come from their Form Tutor, Year Achievement Coordinator, Assistant Principal or Vice Principal. The HT Character Badge will be awarded by the Principal and phone call made directly from him. Students and parents will also receive notification via their Class Charts app once they have crossed the threshold for each award.

Is it possible to achieve these point totals?

The HT Award is a recognition system that students will work towards throughout KS3 (Year 7-9). This means students will carry their achievement points over from year to year. Every student has the ability to earn these achievement points over the three-year period, and clearly the Gold badge, Platinum Cup and HT Character badge require a special level of commitment to our school and local community above and beyond receiving classroom-based achievement points.

How often are the award badges given out?

HT badges will be given out every half-term when updated totals on achievement are calculated. Did you know that you can check your points total on Class Charts and that parents will be notified by the Class Charts app when thresholds are achieved?

Do negative behaviour points count?

No – any student's negative behaviour points will not impact on their receiving of the award. Only positive behaviour points are considered in the HT award i.e. negative behaviour points do not reduce achievement points.

Do students get any recognition for good attendance?

Yes – every half term those students with 96% attendance will receive an additional 10 achievement points.

Achievement Points

Students receive Achievement and House Points from staff for school learning, homework, community and co-curricular contributions. The total of House Points is calculated on a monthly basis and they feed in to the annual House Competition.

Student of the Week

One student will be nominated from each year and congratulated in their Year Group assembly and HT News. Students are nominated for going above and beyond the normal expectations.

Phone calls home

Each week staff members will choose up to 5 students to positively recognise and praise. Staff will make a phone call home to parents.

Postcards Home

Students will have opportunities to receive a postcard home for over and above recognition and exceeding our minimum expectations of Ready, Respectful and Safe.

Hot Chocolate with the Principal

Students are nominated by their subject teacher and are sent an invitation to join the Principal for a Hot Chocolate and to discuss their outstanding achievement.

House points

All students are members of one of six Houses. The Houses are competing in the academic, sporting and co-curricular competitions to win the prestigious House Cup. All House Points awarded to students count towards this competition.

Awards Evening

Every Spring Term students from all years are nominated by their subject teachers for an award for outstanding work. Families are invited to join students and staff to celebrate their achievements at Awards Evening.

The Haileybury Turnford House system comprises of six houses; Bevan, Pankhurst, Shackleton, Turing, Austen and Bader. Each tutor group, including the Tutor, will all belong to the same house to encourage collaboration and a team ethos within the tutor group.

By the conclusion of the academic year, we want students to have had numerous opportunities to represent their House.

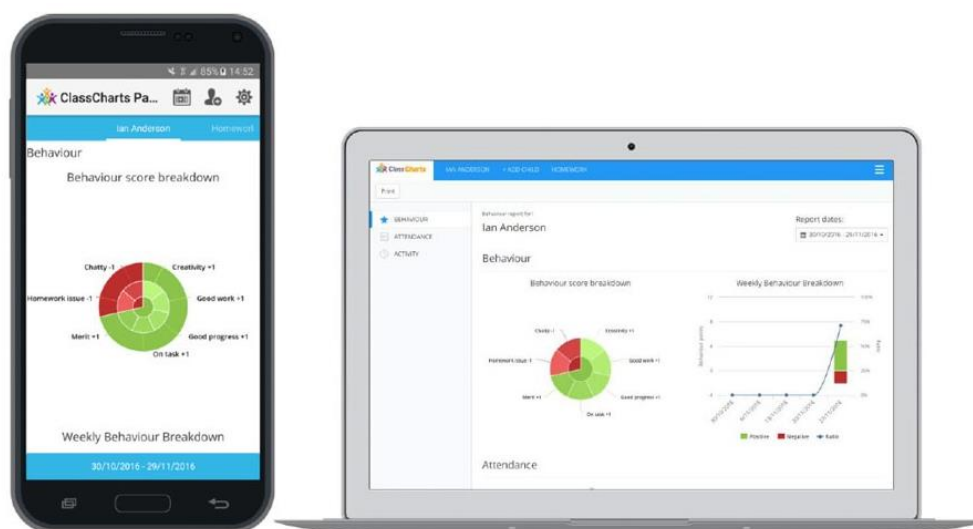

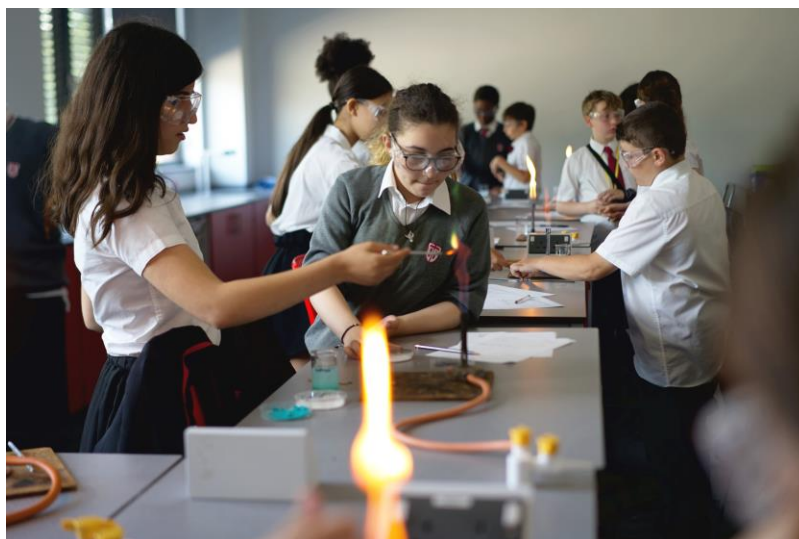
At Haileybury Turnford we use an online system known as Class Charts. You will be able to use Class Charts to keep track of your child's behaviour and access and view their assigned homework and online learning tasks and view announcements from the school.

If you have more than one child, you can access Class Charts information about your children from a single, centralised parent account.

Class Charts for parents can be accessed via the Class Charts website or through an iOS and Android App.



You will receive a Parent Code from the school. The code is used to set up your Class Charts parent account and you will receive instructions on how to access and set up your account. Once you have signed up to Class Charts, you can log back into your parent account at any time.



Anti-Bullying Procedures

Bullying may be verbal, physical or indirect. In fact, any action, which repeatedly makes a child feel uncomfortable, insecure or threatened, may be defined as bullying. The school disapproves of bullying in all its forms and considers it a most serious offence. Students should be aware that bullying is completely unacceptable at Haileybury Turnford and they will be treated sympathetically if they tell someone if it has happened to them. The Principal and senior staff take the lead in creating a climate in which students will be encouraged to report immediately any bullying incident in the expectation that it will be dealt with urgently and fairly. All staff are required to report incidents of bullying to the Tutor and Year Achievement Coordinator of both bullies and victims. Year Achievement Coordinators must then report the incident to senior staff. Please see our school website for our full Positive Relationships Policy

Advice for your child - What helps?

- Tell your child: "If you're being bullied it's not your fault";
- Let your child give their account in their own words if they can;
- Be clear, it is important that the bullying stops and that school will have to be involved;
- Find out which teacher your child would like you to talk to;
- Give lots of love and reassurance to your child;
- Contact school as soon as possible.

Talking to the school

- Be aware that teachers may have no idea your child is being bullied or may have another account of the incident;
- If you can – give names, places, times and dates;
- Give the school time to thoroughly follow up your concerns;
- Ask to be kept well informed and keep a log of the bullying.
- The school is there to help you and your child, please try to work with the school at all times.

Medication in School

Students are permitted to carry a small amount of medication around with them in the school. An EpiPen, asthma pump or diabetic insulin kit are also permitted. Only prescribed medication is kept in the Medical office. The school does not have a supply of medication to be given to students with or without consent of a parent/carer. Any prescribed medication required by a student must be supplied by parent/carer. It must be brought in, in its original packaging including instructions from the prescriber and handed to the Medical Office. A parent/carer Consent Form must also be completed and kept with the medication. All medications are stored in a secure medical cabinet or the fridge including spare EpiPen's or asthma pumps if required in the Medical Office. You will be notified at any time if the expiry date is due and will be required to bring in new medication.

All medication taken in school by a student is recorded. If you no longer wish for your student to have medication kept in school, or the medication needs to be changed please inform the Medical Office immediately on 01992 308333 ext.205 if you have any issues or concerns, or if your child requires a Health Care Plan for an on-going medical condition.

Good attendance and punctuality are vital to ensure your child reaches their full potential.

It is anticipated and expected that every student will aim to achieve at least 96% attendance. We monitor attendance to every lesson on a daily basis.

Family Holidays

May we remind all parents that holidays are not allowed in school term time. The expectation is that you take family holiday outside of term time. If you take your child on holiday in term time the school may request the Local Authority to issue a Fixed Penalty Notice. From August 2024, the fine for school absences across the country will be £80 if paid within 21 days, or £160 if paid within 28 days. This rate is in line with inflation and is the first increase since 2012. In case of repeated fines, if a parent receives a second fine for the same child within any three-year period, this will be charged at the higher rate of £160. Fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action like a parenting order or prosecution will be considered. If you're prosecuted and attend court because your child hasn't been attending school, you could get a fine up to £2,500. Money raised via fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the government.

Medical/Dental Appointments

Please make medical and dental appointments outside school hours whenever possible. We do understand that some appointments cannot be avoided and will fall during school time. We do ask that your child catches up with any work missed to ensure the continuity of their learning. It is the responsibility of your child to speak to the teachers concerned in order to ensure they have caught up on any missed work.

Absence due to Illness and Medical Appointments

If your child is unwell and not fit to attend school, please ensure you ring the school's absence line on the first day. We then ask you to keep us informed of their progress and provide medical notes from a GP if your child requires more than 4 days away from the school due to illness. Our Attendance Officer will contact you if we have not received information about the absence of your child.

Call 01992 308333 Option 1 and leave a message on the absence line. Send a copy of the medical appointment letter/card on your child's return. Send an Email to: attendance@haileyburyturnford.com

If your child is taken ill at the school, after visiting the Medical Office and if it is felt they need to go home we will require a parent to collect the student for health and safety reasons. Repeated non-attendance or lateness to school will be treated very seriously and if your child is repeatedly absent or late to school without a valid reason parents will receive a letter, warning about the legal consequences of persistent absence. Persistent absence to school will result in parents/carers being warned and then issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice involving a fine.

Lateness to school and lessons

Lateness is disruptive for students and teachers, and students who are persistently late without good reason will be placed in payback. As a general rule, lateness to school on two occasions will result in a payback and lateness to lessons on three occasions will also result in an additional payback.

We believe our school uniform should give students a sense of common identity and belonging and help to create the school ethos as a place of learning for all students. We have attempted to implement a Uniform Policy which is cost-effective and keeps branded items to a minimum, enabling parents/carers the opportunity to purchase essential items from a variety of suppliers. We believe having our distinct, practical and cost-effective HT uniform can support to set the appropriate tone for learning in our school and also acts to be an important social leveller. We have reviewed our existing School Uniform Policy recently and in consultation with parents and carers have aimed to ensure we can continue to be as cost-effective as possible and maintain our sense of identity and belonging as the HT community. In considering an reviewing our Uniform Policy we wish to ensure we are committing to five core principles:

- Ensuring that branded items of school clothing items are kept to a minimum for necessary items.
- Work with suppliers to ensure all costs are kept to a minimum without compromising the quality of uniform and offer value for money.
- Costs for items are required to be competitively priced.
- Will look to work with families who potentially find the cost of uniform a barrier to their child coming to school to ensure there is the right support in place.
- We will keep sport kits to a minimum, to ensure costs are minimised.

Ready for Learning: School Uniform

Please clearly label all items your child's uniform.

Outdoor Clothing

Blazers should be worn to and from school but can be removed during lessons with the teacher's permission. Sweatshirts and fleeces (including hoodies) are not permitted and will be confiscated if worn to school.

We ask that coats are black or dark coloured, and that additions; such as scarves and hats in winter are kept to a minimum as they are easy to misplace. Coats, scarves, hats and gloves should not be worn inside the school building.

Jewellery

Earrings are permitted as long as only a small plain stud is worn in each ear lobe (lower lobe), no other piercings are allowed. The only other jewellery allowed is a wristwatch. If your child is wearing any other jewellery, they will be told to remove it. Should they be requested, it will be confiscated and kept safe for them to collect at the end of the day. Smart phone wristwatches are not permitted.

Shoes

Black shoes which can be polished, with no coloured trimmings. Trainers, canvas shoes and boots above the ankle are not acceptable.



Nail Polish

Nail polish, acrylic nails or gel nails are not permitted at any time. Students wearing nail polish will be asked to remove this or sent home to remove the acrylic/gel nails. Make-up if worn, must be subtle and natural in appearance.

Hairstyles

Individual fashion statements such as extreme dyed hair colours and styles are not permitted. Any student with an extreme hair colour or hairstyle will be asked to rectify their hairstyle or hair colour at

the earliest opportunity and may be sent home to do this. Students may be asked to work in isolation until the hairstyle has been rectified. Students with long hair must carry a means for ensuring their hair can be tied back for practical lessons such as PE and Design and Technology. Tram lines, shaved shapes in the hair or 'bar codes' in the eyebrows are not permitted. Afro-textured hair worn in styles including, but not limited to, afros, locks, twists, braids, cornrows, fades, hair straightened through the application of heat or chemicals, and weaves and wigs are permitted. Bicycles

Due to a number of cycling related incidents in Cheshunt and Turnford, the busy main road near to our school and our responsibility to safeguard and protect our students, we have introduced an expectation that every student riding a bike to school is strongly encouraged **to wear a cycle helmet**. Therefore, please make sure your child has a helmet that fits correctly and can be stored safely with the bike in the bike shed. (Most cycle locks can be threaded through the holes in the cycle helmet).

Please be aware if your child cycles to school they will need to ensure their bike lock is removed from the cycle racks as our site team will be cutting off and disposing of any remaining bike locks as we prepare and tidy the school site for the new academic year. Thank you for your cooperation in supporting our students to keep safe whilst travelling to and from school.

School bag large enough for equipment

All students must have the following equipment:

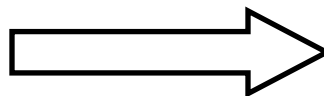
- Black/blue fountain or ball-point pen
- Red pen
- Ruler (with metric divisions)
- Pencil
- Eraser
- Protractor
- Reading Book
- Scientific Calculator (e.g. Casio)



It is essential that your child brings the correct equipment to school everyday

Articles of value such as an iPad, gold jewellery, expensive pens, and large sums of money should not be brought to school. We cannot accept responsibility if your child brings an object of value into the school and this gets damaged or goes missing.

School bag large enough for equipment



The school operates a cashless catering system. Each student is biometrically identified using an algorithm taken from an electronic finger imprint, allowing them to pay for meals. As each child pays the same way no one knows who has or does not have a Free School Meal (FSM) allowance which removes any associated potential stigma.

You can pay between daily, weekly or one year's dinner money onto your child's account. The school automatically sets an upper limit of £7 on the amount of money that can be spent in one day. If you would like this amount changed, please call the school to amend the amount either to increase or decrease their daily allowance.

For those students receiving Free School Meals (FSMs) the allowance is loaded onto the account daily. You are welcome to 'top up' the FSM allowance at any time, particularly if your child plans to use the Dining Hall at any other time apart from lunchtime.

As mentioned above, the only method of payment is through ParentPay. Payments made from ParentPay will be automatically credited to your child's balance. Please note: cash will not be accepted at the food counter till points.

All property including articles of clothing must be clearly marked with the owner's name.

Articles of value such as an iPad. Gold jewellery, expensive pens and large sums of money should not be brought to school. We cannot accept responsibility if your child brings an object of value into the school and this gets damage or goes missing.

Lost property is kept in the PE Faculty. Named items are returned to the owner. All unmarked items are kept until the end of term when they are disposed of. Should your child lose an item, please ensure they check with the PE Faculty before contacting your child's Tutor.

Being Ready to learn: Mobile Phone Policy

At Haileybury Turnford we believe a mobile phone is a form of communication, however mobile phones must be switched off and out of sight during the school day and on the school premises at all times. If mobile phones, headphones, or earpieces are used during the school day a student will have them confiscated immediately. Students will be able to collect their phone from the Principal's Office at the end of the school day. If a student has their phone confiscated on more than one occasion during a half term, we will ask parents to collect their child's phone. Smart watches and headphones are treated in exactly the same way as mobile phones.

The simple rule is a mobile phone should be switched off and out of sight. Should your child need to make an urgent call home, they are encouraged to ask their Year Achievement Coordinator and usually they will be given permission to make a call from the Medical Office or a Pastoral Office.

Parents and carers are asked not to contact their child in school on their mobile phone. This includes texting or leaving voice messages on your child's phone, as students are not allowed to access their mobile phones during the school day.

PE Faculty

In order to support students in taking responsibility for valuable items such as mobile phones, the PE Faculty offer students the opportunity to place their valuable items in a secured valuables box. Please discuss with your child the importance of using this box to store their phone during their PE lesson.

Please note that the changing rooms are not always locked during lessons as other events are taking place - therefore students are urged to use the valuables box. The PE Faculty cannot be held responsible for valuable items that could go missing if students leave their possessions in the changing rooms. All valuables must be given in to the member of staff and kept secure in the valuables box during the PE lesson.

PE

PE is an integral part of the learning experience at Haileybury Turnford. All students are expected to bring the correct PE kit to all their lessons. If a student is injured they are encouraged to take on adopted roles in the lesson, such as coach or referee and they are still expected to be in full PE kit.

The School Day/Week

The school day is from 8.35am to 3.05pm with co-curricular activities also after lesson 5.

Before the start of the school day

Being punctual and arriving on time is important and it is expected that your child arrives promptly to school. Any student that arrives late to school will be marked as 'late' and enter via the School Reception. If your child does not have a valid reason for arriving late they will be expected to serve a payback with their Year Achievement Coordinator. If they are late on more than one occasion in a week, your child will attend an additional after school payback and this could include a Saturday morning payback. *(Hot and cold food and drinks are available in the Dining Hall every day from 7.45am – 8.25am).*

Lunchtime Arrangements

All students are required to stay on the school site at lunchtime. If you send your child with a packed lunch please consider making the contents "healthy". For further guidance on what is considered a healthy packed lunch, please refer to: www.schoolfoodtrust.org.uk

Our Flexible Learning Centre team are here to support students who may need extra help, both in and out of the classroom. We have Link Workers and Learning Support Assistants to support in-class and to provide targeted interventions.

Our SENCO is Mrs Goodes, Senior Vice Principal; she provides the strategic leadership for students with SEND at Haileybury Turnford. The Flex Centre is managed by the Flex/SEND Coordinator, Mrs Mitchell, should you have any queries about your child's special educational needs/disabilities please liaise in the first instance with Mrs Mitchell (mitchellj@haileyburyturnford.com).

Our Flex team provide students with support in-class and with interventions in literacy, emotional wellbeing/regulation, social skills and more. Each student on our SEN Register has an allocated Link Worker who acts as a point of contact and provides support and acts as a liaison between student, parents/carers and staff regarding their special educational needs. 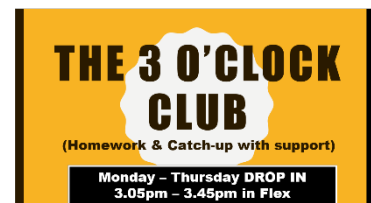
Pen Portraits - To aid our teaching staff to best support your child's learning and experience at Haileybury Turnford, we provide staff with a student profile detailing the strengths and needs of your child and outlines the best strategies to use in class. We use information from professionals, primary school and parents and the student themselves to give a broad and brief illustration of the child.

Flex Breakfast Club – our breakfast club is 'by invitation' only. This is an opportunity for students to relax, chat with other students and staff and get ready for the school day. 8.15–8.35am daily.



Flex Lunch Club – our lunch club is open to all students; this is a calm and safe place for those who do not wish to be out and about during lunch time. We have games, colouring, drawing, puzzles, knitting, binca sewing, films, books and more available in the Flex Centre daily and at lunch time.

What we offer

Our school aims to support, teach and monitor the progress and achievement of bilingual, refugee and newly immigrated students at Haileybury Turnford. These students are categorised as English as an Additional Language (EAL) and often have varying levels of either home language or English language fluency. Once enrolled at Haileybury Turnford, our EAL Coordinator will assess the student for their fluency in English. If the student requires additional support, then it is likely that they will be provided with small group specialist provision by our EAL Coordinator as well as being provided access to Flash Academy, recognised as one of the best online providers of support to students with English as an additional language. These EAL sessions will continue throughout the year and the student will be regularly assessed and their proficiency monitored. Staff are regularly updated with information on strategies to support students with EAL.

Haileybury Turnford believes that home languages are an important skill to support and develop. Opportunities are being developed for the next academic year which include the bilingual mentoring of new students by older students, home language GCSEs and community language events. Parents can be assured that the languages spoken at home are just as valued and valuable as learning good academic English. It is best if parents let the school know which languages are spoken.

My child doesn't speak much English

Your child will be assessed for how much English they speak when they come to Haileybury Turnford. They will be put in contact with a peer mentor, hopefully one who speaks their language. They will also be carefully placed in a form where there are children who can help them by translating or with staff who can translate. Extra support will be provided.

We recommend that you download the Duolingo app on your child's phone to help them learn some basic English. Duolingo has English lessons for speakers of other languages. Just scroll down to the bottom of the list of languages to choose.

Should I continue to read and write with my child in my language?

Haileybury Turnford encourages parents and carers to read and write in their home language with their child. Bilingual books are available from most local libraries and can be requested in over 50 languages. This will enable students to prepare themselves over time for an extra GCSE exam in their home language as well as improving their overall literacy skills.

Home Language GCSEs and the English Baccalaureate

Supporting and encouraging bilingualism is a key part of our school. The EAL coordinator will work with the Modern Foreign Languages Department to identify bi-literate students who can achieve home language GCSEs or other qualifications either as extra GCSEs or as part of the English Baccalaureate qualification. Students who could take such qualifications but may not have strong literacy in their home language are encouraged to study their own language with their families, where possible.

All bilingual students are encouraged to use any community language skills they have in a positive way to help fellow community-language peers in their classes or tutor groups where a new student's English proficiency is still developing.

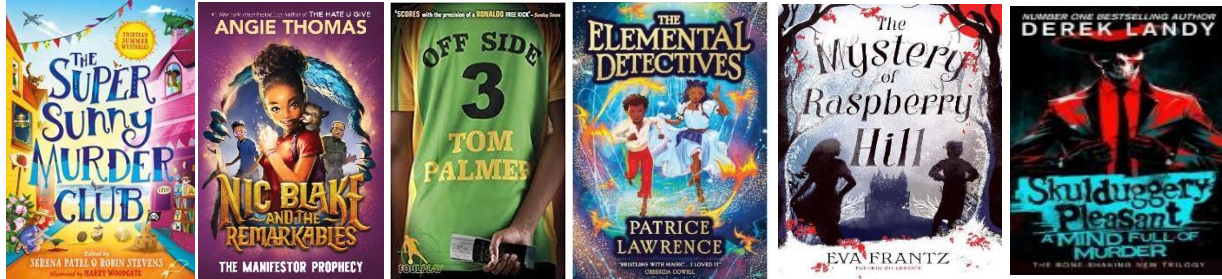
Relationships and Sex Education

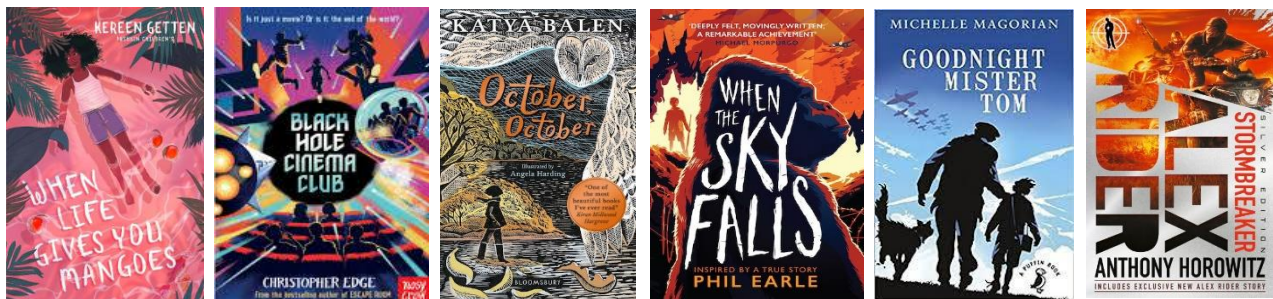

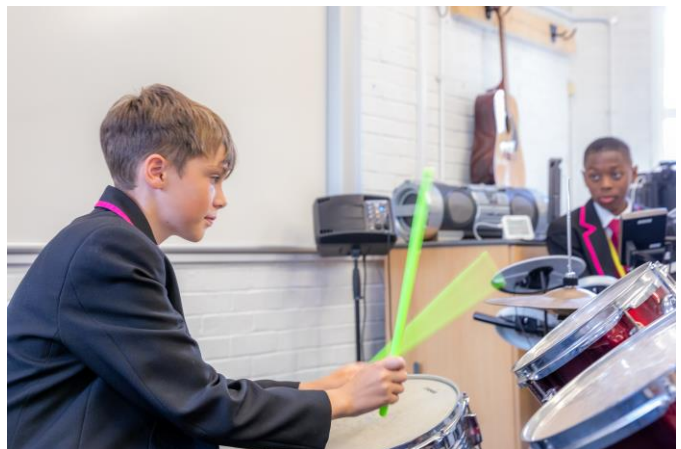
Registration for instrumental lessons

During Year 7 your child will be participating in Design & Technology lessons as part of the KS3 curriculum. Within our subject area students will have the opportunity to engage in a range of projects in their Design and Technology lessons each week.

As a faculty we provide an interesting, current and engaging curriculum which includes the designing and manufacturing of products that your child will get to keep and take home.

In KS3 we operate a carousel where students rotate around Food and Nutrition, Design and Technology and Engineering based projects where they make a wide range of working products and prepare a variety of dishes in food.

Our faculty budget is sufficient to cover the costs of the basic materials and dry store ingredients. However, we ask for **£15.00** from each student to cover the cost of the perishable items and more complex ingredients which we provide for the recipes that students will be making in their first year.

We provide the ingredients as it alleviates the stress for parents as you will not need to go out and buy ingredients every time your child cooks as well as working out much more cost effective as we can buy in bulk.

Contributions can be paid via Parent Pay which can be accessed via our school website once your account has been set up by the school (You should receive notification when your account has been set up towards the end of August). Unfortunately, we cannot accept contributions in the form of cash or cheque.

We ask that payments are made before we start in September so that all students are ready to cook in the first weeks of the new term.

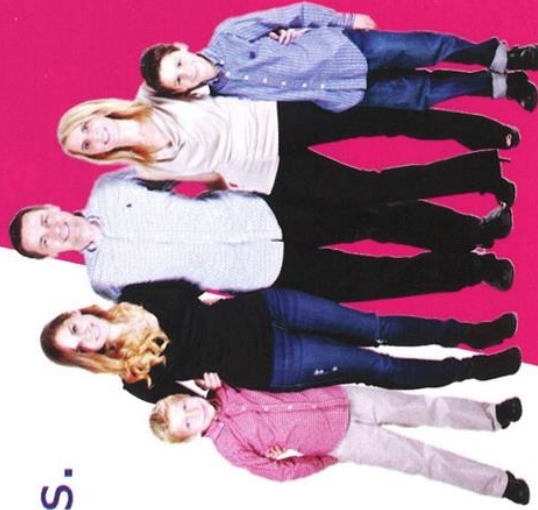
