Dear Parent/Carer

We are delighted to share our plans for a **Cultural Dress Day** on **Thursday 23rd October 2025**, an initiative inspired by our Black Lives Matter Committee to **raise awareness of the diverse cultures represented within our school community**. This special day is a celebration of the unique backgrounds and traditions that make Haileybury Turnford such a vibrant and inclusive environment.

On this day, **students** are **invited** to **wear traditional or cultural clothing** that reflects their heritage. We encourage families to choose outfits that are respectful, appropriate for the school setting, and aligned with our school's ethos. **Some examples of traditional dress might include:**

- Kente Cloth a brightly colored, handwoven fabric traditionally worn by both men and women in Ghana
- Dashiki a colourful tunic commonly worn by men and women in West Africa.
- **Kaftan** a long, flowing robe worn by men and women across the Middle East, North Africa, and West Africa, adorned with intricate designs.
- Sari a traditional garment worn by women in India
- Agbada a wide-sleeved robe worn by men in West and North Africa
- Sherwani a coat-like garment worn in South Asia
- Kilt a knee-length skirt worn by men in the Scottish Highlands
- Modern British cultural dress for example, costumes inspired by the 1960s "Mod" movement, 1970s disco style, or 1990s Britpop era

Both students and staff are encouraged to participate in **Cultural Dress Day**, celebrating their culture through traditional attire. Please note, however, that this day is **not a non-uniform day**—only those wearing traditional cultural clothing may wear non-uniform. **Casual clothing such as football jerseys, leggings, jeans, or t-shirts are not permitted**. Students must still **wear their school shoes, unless their shoes are part of their cultural dress**, school lanyards and ID cards.

For students who will not wear traditional cultural clothing, they are expected to attend school in their **full school** uniform. This is not a day for wearing casual clothing, and students who are not in appropriate dress will be asked to return home and change into their uniform.
